CONVENTION POLICIES

Use of Handheld Mobile Devices is Permitted for:

- Purposes of Bible use, Bible reference, and note-taking during all sessions.
- Camera or clock use throughout the day.
- General use during free time.

At no time during sessions are students to be using earbuds, air pods, or any similar listening devices.

DISCLAIMER:

- If staff see your phone becoming a distraction to yourself or others, they will ask you to put it down.
- If it continues to be a problem, FLY staff will take it away for the rest of that session.
- The FLY Committee is not responsible for any lost or stolen items.

CONVENTION POLICIES

Please leave knives, skateboards, tobacco, vaporizers, and any of the following prohibited items at home.

The FLY Convention® holds a Zero Tolerance Policy for illegal and prohibited weapons (including firearms, explosives, knives and other weapons that might be considered dangerous or that could cause harm), tobacco, alcohol (in any form), marijuana, any marijuana products (including any substance containing any quantity of delta-9-tetrahydrocanabinol), e-cigarettes (and e-cig. juice), vaporizers (and vape juice), drug paraphernalia (including syringes unless needed for prescription medication), and other drugs. Drugs include, but are not limited to, the following: any mind-altering or psychoactive substance and their analogs (without a valid doctor's prescription); any controlled substance, scheduled drug, and their analogs (without a valid prescription); any substance that cannot be legally possessed by the individual according to either state or federal law; any substance that can be readily abused as a mind-altering substance; or any other substance

that is used or intended to be used as a drug of abuse.

Skateboards, longboards, razors, and other similar coasting devices are not permitted on YMCA paved areas.

Remedial action will be taken if any attendee is caught using or in possession of these things. Remedial action may include, but is not limited to, the attendee being sent home at their expense, the prohibited items being mailed home at the owner's expense, or other remedial actions. Any criminal conduct will be reported to the local authorities. FLY Convention® Security reserves the right to search dorm rooms, one's person, and one's possessions, if FLY Convention® staff suspects that the Zero Tolerance Policy has been violated. The Crisis Response Coordinator and the FLY Committee will make all decisions for remedial action for each attendee.

All adults, dorm room leaders, and staff attending the FLY Convention® are expected to act in accordance with and are subject to this policy.

CONVENTION POLICIES

Mountain Hiking:

- All YMCA hiking trails are open unless restricted by the YMCA or FLY.
- All hiking is "at your own risk." Trails are not consistently monitored. Hiking should be performed in groups only at the designated times.
- · Closures will be announced during evening announcements.
- · Eagle Cliff is closed indefinitely.
- Hiking during the morning or evening sessions is not allowed.
- Signing out/in for hiking on trails leading from the YMCA during the recreation hours of 1-5 p.m. is not required.
- Sunrise hikes are permitted, but all hikers must be signed out the day before by an adult leader in the FLY Convention® office. Each hiker is required to have a flashlight. The FLY Convention® office has a limited number of flashlights available for rent. Upon returning from their hike, an adult leader must check in the entire group at the FLY Convention® office.
- No sunset hikes are allowed.
- · For information about hiking trails, see the Sweet Memorial Building.

Leaving YMCA Campus:

- All registered students and Dorm Room Leaders (DRL) must not leave the YMCA campus for any reason (including during the afternoon recreational hours) without signing out with the FLY Convention® office.
- Only the group leader, not a DRL, is allowed to check out a group. All names of those who are leaving must be listed.
- Upon return, the leader must check their group back in at the FLY Convention® office.
- Per the session policy, no off campus activities are to be organized that would remove students from attending morning or evening sessions.
- If an emergency arises, and the group will not make it back before the evening service, they should call the FLY Convention® office.



REQUIRED:

(for all students and Dorm Room Leaders)

All morning sessions (worship times, large group workshops, elective hour, and Bible studies)

Evening sessions

Late hour sessions

Dorm devotions



• Daily meetings are required for all Dorm Room Leaders.

All afternoon activities are optional.

All Students and Dorm Room Leaders are expected to attend all required sessions with the following exceptions:

1) Health Concerns. If a student or dorm room leader becomes ill during the week, or extremely overtired, they may only be excused from a required session with a written excuse. Please follow these steps:

i) When reasonably possible, the ill attendee should first consult with their youth leader or dorm room leader. If the illness needs further attention or the leader feels the attendee might need to be excused from a session, the leader can then direct the attendee to the First Aid office.

ii) First Aid staff will assess the attendee, and may provide a written excuse to miss a session(s) at their discretion.

iii) The ill attendee must remain in the care of the First Aid team. They can only be released into the care of their Youth Leader, Dorm Room Leader, or another designated adult to be accompanied to their dorm room to rest. (Adult dorm room leaders may be released with a written note.) **2)** Conviction or Objection. If an adult (Parent, Pastor, or Youth Leader) finds a session or offerings at the 2023 FLY Convention® to be in conflict with their personal convictions and would prefer their student(s) to not attend a particular session, they may be excused. Please follow these steps:

a) If the objection arises before the Convention:

i) Please contact the 2023 FLY President Gideon Johnson or FLY Convention® Coordinator Daniel Keinanen to express concern.

ii) After which, if the objection still exists, a document outlining the objection and agreed upon solution will be signed.

iii) FLY Staff will work with church leaders at the Convention to assure the agreed plan is executed.

b) If the objection arises at the Convention:

i) The concerned adult (Parent, Pastor, or Youth Leader) should seek out a member of our Crisis Response Team to express their concern.

ii) A statement outlining the concern, the agreed upon solution, and the names of who are asking to leave will be drafted and signed.

iii) The concerned adult (Parent, Pastor, or Youth Leader) will be allowed to leave the session with their students to a designated area, and will be fully responsible for the students until they return to the regular sessions.

- Only adults (Parents, Pastors, and Youth Leaders) can object to and leave a session; students who have an objection must work through their leader as outlined above. Students are not allowed to leave a required session without an adult.
- Dorm Room Leaders cannot remove students from a session if those students are not from their local congregation, unless the leader from their local congregation agrees.
- A congregational leader can object and remove students not staying in their room. However, these students must then remain in the care of the said leader until the session is over.
- A FLY Committee member will follow up with the involved parties.

Intervention Resource Team

God doesn't want us to be alone with our struggles. Along with your Dorm Room Leaders and other convention leaders, FLY staff includes the Intervention Resources Team. The team is made up of women and men with specialized training to talk with you about challenges and how you can overcome them. They can help you face school problems, anxiety, relationship problems, fear, family problems, pornography, depression, cutting, thoughts of suicide, or other challenges. You can meet with one of them by yourself or you can bring a friend, a Dorm Room Leader, etc. Don't go it alone!

1. Race. What Does The Bible Say About Race?

As a result of God's work of creation and recreation, there is no place for racism in a Christian worldview. We are all made in the image of God, and Christ died for us all. How can we address racism as Christians in talking with others?

Understanding and Teaching God's Design for Sex and Gender ASSEMBLY C | DR. WALT MUELLER

Our children and teens are growing up in a world where "It's all up to you!" is the mantra that guides – or more accurately mis-guides – our students into embracing and living out ideologies on sex and gender that undermine their human flourishing. In this four-part seminar, Walt will walk you through how the Sex Positive movement and LGBTQ+ ideologies are forming the beliefs and behaviors of our kids, along with how and what to teach about the beauty of God's sex-and-gender-positive design as the path to spiritual growth, relational growth, and sexual flourishing.



Dr. Walt Mueller is the founder and President of the Center for Parent/Youth Understanding, a nonprofit organization serving schools, churches, and community organizations across the U.S, Canada, and worldwide in their efforts to strengthen families. Walt has been working with young people and families for over 35 years. 


The Bryan Drake Show

Today, Ben lives completely sober, while sharing his story filled with hope, mercy and grace.





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
